The charity walk can be implemented as a regional activity and in your own community and school. It is great fun and an easy way to help raise \$75,000 for the state project.


Just contact your community leaders for approval, copy the Member/Adviser Pledge Form, collect the pledges--and walk! A good way to increase participation is to offer prizes.

The PA FBLA Keystone Leadership Award recognizes members who go above and beyond in their FBLA involvement. This award certifies a "complete" FBLA accomplishment:



Attention all FBLA members and advisers—especially those of you who will be graduating this year—I have just one word for you! Scholarships!! For more than 20 years, Pennsylvania FBLA has sponsored a scholarship program whereby deserving students can earn scholarships worth thousands of dollars. Throughout the years, this program has grown both in size and in stature.

Currently, there are 26 schools offering these scholarships—schools such as the Allentown Business School and Keystone College in northeastern Pennsylvania, Central Pennsylvania College near Harrisburg, and the Boyd School and the Douglas Education Center in Western PA.

Whether you're interested in attending a 2-year or 4-year school; whether you're hoping to earn an associate's degree or a bachelor's degree; whether you're planning to major in computer programming or hotel & restaurant management, there might be a scholarship with your name on it. No FBLA member should be deprived of a postsecondary education because he or she lacks the necessary funds for tuition.

By now, every FBLA chapter should have received a scholarship packet featuring a poster listing the 26 schools offering FBLA scholarships. If you haven't already done so, advisers, please display this poster in a prominent place and encourage your members to apply for these scholarships.

Another important scholarship that should be of interest to all FBLA members is the William Selden Scholarship. Named for the former Pennsylvania FBLA State Chairman and Supervisor of Vocational Business Education, the purpose of this scholarship is to recognize outstanding chapter members by presenting them with cash awards. At the 2002 State Leadership Conference in April, ten outstanding chapter members will receive this award. If you are an active member and have been involved with this organization on the local, regional, state and/or national levels, you could be one of those ten recognized.

The Who's Who Criteria, which consists of approximately 30 items, will be used to determine the winners. However, only one member per chapter is eligible to apply.

I'm sure you've heard the saying, "You can't win if you don't play!" The same rule applies here: Unless you apply for one of these scholarships, you won't be able to reap the rewards. FBLA members, there's money out there for your college education. Now is the time to go out and get it!

Waynesboro extends wishes for a happy holiday season to all Pennsylvania chapters! We look forward to seeing you at Seven Springs in April.



SOUTH WESTEREN MAKES SOME GOOD POINTS



The 2001 chapter of FBLA at South Western High School is going to be the most successful yet. Many new members have come into the organization, and a team of driven officers has been assembled. Some activities from years past are going to be continued with more success, while other new activities are going to be tried. This year our chapter is also going to send many delegates to the local, state and national conferences.

In order to promote attendance and participation in our chapter's events and meetings, this year's officers have implemented a points system into our FBLA. The point system is organized so that members who cannot make some of our large meetings can do other things and still be involved and informed in our organization. If a member of our chapter attends a meeting, which is held twice a month, this member receives a point from our secretary. If the member attends both monthly meetings, they will have filled the quota of points for that month. However, if a member is absent from a meeting for any reason this individual will have to make up the missed meeting by helping at one of the many functions that our chapter conducts. When the individual makes up the missed meeting by attending another function they will receive their point and remain in the organization. If a member does not fill their monthly requirement the matter will be discussed with the individual and if necessary removal from the organization. It is set-up to make sure that all members are held accountable.

Some new things that our chapter is doing this fall are morning breakfasts and selling school store items at football games. The FBLA breakfasts are held on Tuesday and Friday mornings. Our chapter sells Otis Spunkmeyer blueberry and apple cinnamon muffins along with plain Otis Spunkmeyer bagels. The muffins are seventy-five cents while the bagels run for fifty cents. Attendance at these breakfasts, which begins at 7:15 and run until 7:45, will result in a point for a member. The second activity is a merchandise sale at our home football games. We help our school store by supplying individuals from our chapter to man a table with items from our school store on it for the first half of our football games. Attendance at this, again, will result in a point for the member and in addition members can accumulate community service hours.

Our organization is also running several fundraisers this year. We are conducting a Joe Corbi's Pizza sale and a sub sale. Our chapter is also running an Awake-A-Thon. This is where all members of the organization raise pledges for themselves in order to stay up all night. At this event, we'd prepare flower arrangements as centerpieces for Thanksgiving. All of the proceeds from these fundraisers are going to benefit the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation.
