What is the American Lung Association?

The American Lung Association (ALA) is the nation's oldest voluntary health agency. It was originally organized to fight tuberculosis. Since 1892, the American Lung Association of Pennsylvania (ALAPA) has been fighting lung disease through education. community service. advocacy, and research. ALA attains its many successes through the work of thousands of dedicated volunteers and staff. A contribution of time. money and event sponsorships to the ALAPA help those who suffer with lung disease through mission driven programs and activities. The ALAPA has many programs and strategies for fighting lung disease. For example, Open Airways for School is an elementary school education program for children with asthma. This program teaches children with asthma to understand and manage their illness so they can have more normal lives.

Why did we pick the American

Lung Association? During our Executive Committee Meeting in June, Brett Hollister, State President said, "I believe that the ALA is a great charity to support. By selecting this organization, it will create an awareness of lung disease throughout the state. For example, did you know that 24 million Americans have asthma? It is estimated that a million children between the ages of 8 and 11 years old suffer from asthma disease. Did you also know that smokingrelated diseases claim an estimated 430,700 American lives each year?"

Where will the money go that PA FBLA raises?

We selected this organization in hope of sponsoring an asthma camp with the money raised. The ALAPA conducts several camps every summer for children with asthma. Residential camps cost \$50,000 and day camps cost \$20,000. If PA FBLA provides the funding for a camp, public acknowledgement will be given to us. Camp brochures will state "supported by" the PA Future Business Leaders of America. The money remaining will be used for research to fight lung disease.

We have many ways to encourage membership this year, along with our theme, "Gimme 5." These programs include individual and local chapter membership awards, recognition, and publicity. The



Why Do We Use Parliamentary Procedure?

Parliamentary law began as the rules and customs used in the English Parliament to conduct

business. These laws were brought to America and still provide the basis of the rules of legislative bodies in the United States. Both Houses of Congress use parliamentary procedure in

their proceedings. Any assembly, or group of people, that use parliamentary procedure is known as a deliberative assembly.

Since parliamentary law dates back to the 1700s, one might think it is not applicable today. So why do we still use it? The purpose of parliamentary procedure is to expedite, or accelerate business. Having rules for everyone to follow accordingly prevents disputes and arguments that would otherwise overpower the purpose of a meeting.

To establish effective leadership is another purpose for using parliamentary procedure. It enables the membership of an organization to serve its purpose

and have control over its affairs. True, it is a majority that decides the affairs of the assembly; however, the purpose of being a deliberative assembly is to have full and free discussion among the members.

Through the use of parliamentary procedure, a deliberative assembly is free to do whatever necessary to protect itself and the rights of its members. It is the best

system found to expedite business and protect rights in an assembly—whether it is a small assembly or a large assembly.

Today, the most common manual of parliamentary law is *Robert's Rules of Order*. FBLA has adopted this manual as its official parliamentary authority and follows the rules in formal business meetings. A parliamentarian

Using parliamentary law protects the rights of:

The majority, The minority, Individual members, and Absentees

The rights of all of these together are a byproduct of using parliamentary law. is often appointed to serve the organizations that have adopted these rules. This is a person who has extensive knowledge of parliamentary law, as well as those rules that are listed in a society's bylaws and/or constitution. The parliamentarian answers questions in meetings and advises the president.

As one can see, there are many benefits to using parliamentary procedures. Using these proper procedures allow every member to be heard during a discussion, bring up business that they feel is important and relates to the purpose of the society, and have an opinion on activities the the society participates in and the officers it

elects to lead. Sometimes the laws and rules may be complicated, but they do serve a purpose. To run your FBLA meetings effectively, get out your copy of *Robert's Rules of Order* and get down to business!

The fact that using parliamentary procedure protects the rights of members of a group or organization is another reason we still use these laws.

Running for a State Office Requires That Perfect Recipe

An excellent recipe for running for a State Office requires equal parts of determination, commitment, and support. These ingredients are a must for anyone considering candidacy.

Part 1—Set oven for 2004:

In order to consider your involvement in such a demanding and time-consuming endeavor, it would be a good idea for you to evaluate yourself, your advisers, your parents, and your administration.

After you have determined your dedication, you need to talk with your advisers and your parents to gain their support.

All parties involved must pledge their support and commitment to your cause.

Trying to prepare this meal will be next to impossible without all the right ingredients in the right quantities.

Part 2—Make sure you have everything on hand:

Determine which office best suits your capabilities.

Check FBLA Handbook for all guidelines.

Remember Parliamentarian is NOT an elected position.

Part 3--Helpful Hint when preparing this recipe:

Although YOU may be elected a State Officer, you will constantly need the support of your advisers, parents, school, administration, and school board.

Financial support is a huge part of the process. Your school district will need to sign papers stating that they will not only excuse your adviser from school to attend conferences, workshops and meetings, but they will also pay for all overnight expenses, food, and transportation for that adviser.

If your district is not supportive of this financial obligation, you will be unable to run for an office.

Speaking of your adviser, he/she must be willing to give you the gift of time and patience—this recipe requires equal amounts of each ingredient!!!



Part 4--To assure a tasty outcome:

Apply for the position within the appropriate time line.

Determine local businesses and support systems from which you can solicit campaign materials.

Design a campaign, pick a catchy slogan, and market your attributes and dedication.

Write a two-minute speech following the guidelines.

Study your candidate handbook, so that you understand the rules. Feel comfortable with your platform.

Realize you are working for many other people—it's not just about you!!

Be a team player and a self-starter!!!

Elected positions require specific and appropriate actions just as recipes require specific and accurate ingredients. These actions begin with meeting due dates for all expectations. Secondly, prioritizing your schedule to attend all meetings, conferences, workshops, and planning sessions. Thirdly, coordinating your schedule to allow time for meetings with your adviser in order to fulfill obligations you must complete on your own time.

Unfortunately, not everybody can come up with the correct balance of fresh ingredients, support, money, and time to prepare a delicious campaign. If you think you might have that winning recipe, good luck to you in the next election!
