In our school a teacher's nephew, Adam Recke, suffers a terminal illness called Niemann-Pick C disease, which affects the liver, the spleen, and then the brain. Once we heard about this little boy's situation, we immediately realized how much we wanted to help out the family. Our second annual Scarf Day was coming up, and our chapter decided to send our proceeds to the Recke family. Scarf Day is a school-wide school spirit day which the students buy a specially made sticker for Adam for a dollar and could donate more money to Adam if they wanted. The students then wear it on the specified day with a scarf. All students in the school were informed what the cause is for and who it is going to help.

Last year our FBLA chapter held the first annual Scarf Day and collected over \$1500. (Our school size then was about 1600 kids, almost the entire school participated!) for Ally Heintz, a baby with a serious birth effect, gastrochisis, which means her organs were formed outside of her body. Our contributions were sent directly to her family to help pay medical bills or whatever else Ally may have needed.

This year's second annual scarf day, which was held January 11, 2006, collected \$1500 for the Recke family. A majority of the school participated yet again and helped out a local family in a time of need.

Cocalico FBLA

Cocalico High School FBLA has completed their Community Service Project with the Lancaster Salvation Army. We collected 350 Angel Tree gifts for needing families and traveled to the Salvation Army, Tuesday, December 13, and spent the day volunteering and assisting the local staff with holiday preparations, packing food and gift items, organizing distribution plans, and selecting age-appropriate gifts and necessities for needy children in Lancaster County. Thirty-five members were selected to assist based on their contributions and dedication to our organization during the year. This was a feel-good project, and it was much appreciated by the Salvation Army. We were told that the work we accomplished that day would have taken volunteers three weeks to complete. We were the only school organization to assist this worthy charity this year. We received a certificate and beautiful thank you letter from the administrators of the Salvation Army.

We are currently collecting personal use items for US soldiers serving in Iraq. We are teaming with a local club and sending soap, shampoo, toothpaste, and other personal hygiene items to let our troops know we support them.

Plans are being finalized for an Extreme Dodge Ball Tournament to raise money for our State Project contributions. We are also teaming with the Cocalico Track and Field team to plan a Three-on-Three Basketball Tournament in association with the Penn State Three Diamonds Cancer fund.

Our Partnership With Business Project will soon be completed as we work with local businesses to job shadow with them. They present monthly awards to our members and name a "Student of the Month" who is recognized in school and given a plaque and engraved pen set. A larger plaque lists the names of each recipient and is placed in our FBLA showcase to inspire achievement, leadership, and dedication to our program.

In addition, our chapter has prepared for the RLC, which we will be hosting, January 10, 2006. We are trying the same mass testing trial that will be administered at the State Conference in Hershey in April. We are looking forward to trying this procedure. So far, 326 competitors have registered to attend this RLC. Cocalico FBLA is anticipating having a large group of qualifiers to take in the chocolate at Hershey this April.

The holiday season gave us more opportunities to raise money for this year's state project, The American Heart Association. We sold refreshments at the holiday dance December 17. Cocalico FBLA provides refreshments at all school dances, plays, and musicals. We also had a profitable weekend December 2-4 when we sold refreshments at our school play. the chapter's November 22 meeting. She stressed how important it is to have emergency information on a patient when he/she is brought to the emergency room. Often, emergency personnel do not know who to contact or what allergies or medical conditions a person has when they are brought to the hospital. Having this information can save valuable time.

The ICE Program consists of two components--an ICE card with emergency information on it and a programmed cell phone with ICE contacts.
