his past summer, The Pennsylvania delegation, consisting of 107 students; 53 advisors; 53 parents/guardians or other family members and 4 PA FBLA staff members, traveled to Tennessee to Unlock Their Potential.

Our delegation arrived on June 27, 2006 and traveled to Chattanooga, where we spent the night at the famous Chattanooga Choo Choo, We dined on The Southern Belle riverboat, and spent the night dancing and socializing. The following day the delegation toured the following attractions in Chattanooga: Look-Out Mountain, Ruby Falls, and Rock City. These sites offered magnificent views of the Tennessee Valley, a 1,000 ton balanced rock and a look down under at a beautiful waterfall. The delegation could also attend various workshops from An Interactive Dialogue with Coach Ken Carter to Creating Your Own Destiny in their free time.

As the conference progressed, PA competitors continued on from the preliminaries into the finals. Many delegates also chose to participate in Open Testing to test their knowledge.

Finally Sunday, July 2nd, brought the night that everyone was anticipating, the Awards of Excellence Program. Once again, Pennsylvania competitors helped make us proud as 26 individual and team awards were won! The evening concluded with our Pennsylvania Party where we celebrated our winners and enjoyed Maggie Moo's Ice Cream treats.

Over the past few months, PA FBLA has heard of many new and exciting changes coming from the national offices. Many of these include new competitive events and also bylaw amendments. The PA FBLA Board of Directors and also Executive Committee have been working hard to bring you all this information.

Competitive events are one of the major fundamentals of our organization. This year we have the addition of ten new events. They include Business Financial Plan, Cyber Security, Database Design & Applications, Digital Video Production, E-Business, Electronic Career Portfolio, Global Business, Management Decision Making, and Spreadsheet Applications. Information on these should be known by your advisor and are available in the Chapter Management Handbook.

Along with these new events are the addition of many modifications to the traditional events. These include, but are not limited to, Entrepreneurship may now have two or three members, Accounting II now has a school-site application test, and Business Communication now has a reading comprehension component. See your Chapter Management Handbook for more information.

Finally, one of the major PA bylaw amendments is the addition of another member to the Board of Directors. This position is named Person-at-Large. It can be anyone from a parent to administrator to a former FBLA member. Please see the PA FBLA website for more information.

All of these individuals, who placed at regional's, were all vying for a spot on stage during the awards ceremony. Also in attendance were the regional officers, representing the respective regions around the state, there to support their regional members as well as receive leadership training along the way.

As the end of the 2006 SLC drew near, the new PA FBLA State Officer Team was inducted, ready to serve you in the 2006-2007 PA FBLA year, and a very successful year for PA FBLA came to a end, but will certainly never forgotten!

The end of the SLC brought the 2005-2006 FBLA year to an end ... but also began the 2006-2007 FBLA year with yet again, another bright future for PA FBLA!

Last year, PA FBLA came through in an extraordinary way by contributing nearly \$107,000 for the American Heart Association.

In May, the state officers met for leadership training and the formation of their plans of work. Also during this weekend, the officers were given presentations by three prospective state projects: Concern, Big Brothers Big Sisters, and American Red Cross.

After deliberation, the officers excitedly announced the American Red Cross as the PA FBLA state project for the 2006-2007 state project.

The theme for the partnership is "Providing the tools to prepare for the

3 M'S OF FUNDRAISING

One of the most challenging parts of any organization is fundraising. Trying to find a way to raise money for your local chapter is never easy, but there are ways to help make fundraising easy, & fun, and to encourage members to participate. The three M's of fundraising to remember are:

Merchandise is the foundation of the any fundraiser. A successful fundraiser is one whose merchandise appeals to its customers. An all-time favorite product is food, which can range from hoagies and pizzas, to cookie dough and pies. There are nationally-sponsored fundraisers, such as Tom Wat, Maggie Moo, Profit Potentials, and Ozark Delights. Always check with your school board

and administration for approval of all fundraisers before you start.

Money is the most important part of any fundraiser. A good fundraiser earns at least 50% of the profits. To avoid a lot of problems regarding payments, your chapter should require that all money be turned in with the orders. This will prevent your chapter from losing large sums of money.

Motivating members to sell is always a source of concern. FBLA members are often members of other organizations that participate in fundraisers, so your members (and parents) may be less than willing to sell. Nothing motivates students more than the hope of receiv-

ing a prize in return for their hard work. Cash prizes are usually the best and appeal to the most people. Keep in mind if your chapter gives away cash awards; it will take away from your profits, but it will be well worth the loss to motivate students. Small prizes, such as a free ice cream sandwich at lunch, coupons for restaurants, or gas cards are also well-liked.

Good luck with all your fundraising endeavors! Be sure to email one of the state officers, if your school has a really creative, profitable fundraiser that other chapters should know about.
