## Habitat for Humanity: 2009-2010 State Project

Based on all five presentations that the officers saw during an Executive Committee meeting, the presentation that stood out as an organization that has a mission of helping any and everyone was chosen as our 2009-2010 State Project.

Habitat for Humanity is a nonprofit Christian housing ministry whose mission is to seek to eliminate poverty housing and homelessness from the world and to make decent shelter a matter of conscience and action.

Through volunteerism, labor, giving donations of money and materials; Habitat builds and establishes simple, decent houses alongside our homeowner (partner) families. Habitat is not a giveaway program.

In addition to a down payment and monthly mortgage payments, homeowners invest hundreds of hours of their own labor (sweat equity) into building their Habitat house and the houses of others.

The state officer team decided that our 2009-2010 monetary goal would be \$75,000 the cost to build one home. Today Habitat for Humanity has built over 300,000 houses around the world providing ore than 1.5 million people in 3,000 communities with safe, decent, affordable shelter.

Our first official day of campaigning began on Friday at 7 AM. The officers and I had 2 hours to completely set up my campaign booth. At 9 AM, visitors were allowed entrance to the hall; the swarm of members, advisers and guests began and lasted until 4



PM. Later that night was the exciting Eastern Region meeting. My two opponents, Weishan Wang from New York and Leslie Redmond from Washington D.C., and I had to make speeches in front of the entire region, then together we underwent a

Question and Answer session. These questions ranged from our platforms and goals, to the routes we would take to achieve them. The next day at 9 AM the campaigning reconvened and lasted until 2 PM on Saturday. We had the rest of the day to relax,

until the next morning at the voting session.

When the Eastern Region voting session doors were closed, there were 324 official voting delegates present. That means that for a candidate to win on the first vote, he or she must receive 159 votes, giving that candidate a majority over the other two. Fortunately, with Pennsylvania's 109 present voting delegates, my campaign was able to secure majority on the first vote. Being that we did not know this until the award ceremony later that evening, the rest of the day would be spent trying to relax, wondering if I had been elected.

The Awards of Excellence Ceremony at Anaheim was spectacular this year. Many hardworking members were awarding with top 10 finishes and a trophy to take home. Many of the events were even sponsored, and the event winners received scholarships as well. When the end had come, and the Region Vice Presidents were being announced, my heart began to race. I had mixed emotions; if I had won I needed to remember everyone who made this experience possible. If I had lost, I would have to keep my head up and congratulate the newly elected Eastern Region Vice President. When my name was finally announced as the new Eastern Region Vice President, I could not have been more joyous. All the support from my family and friends had come together and helped me achieve a dream I have had for many years.

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## The Basics of Conducting a Business Meeting

It is very difficult to speak briefly about parliamentary procedures. There are many complex steps, rules, and exceptions to the rules. Today I have decided to give you all a brief run-down of how to conduct a business meeting in nine easy steps.

### Step 1:

Make sure a quorum is present. A quorum is simply the minimum number of members required to be present in order to conduct business. In most organizations the quorum is a majority of its members. Ex: The organization has 50 members in total and its quorum is 25 members. Thirty members are in attendance. Therefore a quorum is present.

### Step 2:

Call the meeting to order. Generally the chair would simply say, "This meeting will now come to order." They would then rap the gavel one time. The gavel should never be rapped more than once!



### Step 3:

Reading approval of and minutes. In this step the minutes, which are a brief description of what was done at the previous meeting, are read to the assembly. This is normally done by the secretary. Corrections can then be made if any mistakes are found in the minutes and the minutes should then be approved. Usually the minutes are approved unanimous consent, which means every one agrees to them without taking a formal vote.

### Step 4:

Reports of officers. Usually the treasurer is the only officer to report. Their report consists of the organization's total funds a n d s p e n d i n g.

### Step 5:

Reports of standing committees. A standing committee is a committee that exists year round and is found in the organization's bylaws. For example: The nominating committee makes nominations for major elections in some organizations.

### Step 6:

Reports of special committees: Special committees are not permanent like standing committees and cease to exist once they submitted their final report. For example: The dance committee may be created specifically to organize the homecoming dance and once the dance is over and the committee gives its final report it is no longer needed and ceases to exist.

### <u>Step 7:</u>

Unfinished business. Unfinished business consists of the motions that were not reached or were not finished at the previous meeting.

### **Step 8:**

New business. New business is the time in the meeting where members can make motions that were not yet considered in the meeting. These motions are main motions. This means that they bring a new subject before the assembly. For example: "I move that the chapter hold a bake sale." This motion would then be debated and voted on.

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# **Fundraising Facts**

Every chapter needs to fundraise to stay afloat, but it is not always easy getting started. Chapters often have plenty of members and plenty of supplies, but they just do not know exactly where to begin. So I would like to give you pointers on how to actually "jumpstart your fundraising machine."

The very first and most important thing I find necessary is chapter plans. You need to sit down and plan out your chapter's goals. For example you need to know how much money you are planning on sending to various charities. This will give you an outline of what you need to raise.

After you have your charities and goal amounts set, you are really ready to start raising the funds. I have developed five tips to help you make your fundraisers successful.

First, plan out the event in detail. You need to make sure you have every aspect of the project thought out.

Second, advertisement is key to the success of your fundraising event. The sky is the limit when it comes to how much you can advertise. Do not rule out things such as TV stations or radio stations, those are key. For example for a breakfast we held at my high school we did tons of advertising. We had posters around the entire district and community, messages on our electronic school board sign. We went on the local radio and

TV stations; we sold pre-order tickets, and placed the event in the local newspaper prior to the event. All of this advertisement proved to be successful at our event, and are simple things you can do also!


Third, allot plenty of time to get the fundraiser underway. Do not rush the event or planning of the event. The fourth tip would be member and community support. This means you need to make sure to find people that are willing to work, donate supplies, and provide a location for the event. It is the members and the community that actually make the event run with their efforts.

Finally, delegate work. Events can be very stressful and consuming so it is necessary for you to delegate work accordingly. If only a few people take on too much of the work, then there is a chance the project will suffer.

If you are still drawing a blank I would like to give you a couple fundraising examples that are successful. Sport tournaments that include students teachers are always sure to attract a crowd. For example a dodge ball tournament with students versus teachers. You would charge admission for everyone who comes to watch the actual event. Serve a meal to the community. An example would be a themed dinner. Each person would buy a ticket and that would be your revenue. Contact corporate businesses and seek their support. If they support your event you will advertise for them in return. Also do not forget about the common fundraisers that work such as: basket auctions, BINGO, car washes, and charity walks.
