The organization's, (UMCOR **www.umcorhaiti.org**), greatest need is for funds that aid international emergency relief efforts. Health kits provide basic necessities to those affected by natural disasters or human

conflict. The kits also serve as learning tools in personal hygiene, literacy, nutrition and cooking classes. A health kit contained:

- 1 hand towel (15" x 25" up to 17" x 27", No kitchen towels)
- 1 washcloth
- 1 comb (large and sturdy, not pocket-sized)
- 1 nail file or fingernail clippers (no emery boards or toenail clippers)
- 1 bath-size bar of soap (3 oz. and up)
- 1 toothbrush (single brushes only in original wrapper, No child-size)
- 6 adhesive plastic strip sterile bandages
- \$1.00 to purchase toothpaste (can only be purchased by UMCOR)

We are also planning an end of the year trip to New York City in April. In NYC we plan to tour Madison Square Garden, see a Broadway play, and visit the financial district.

In the next few months, Central Columbia FBLA hopes to have a successful State Leadership Conference and have a fun educational trip to the Big Apple.
