- b. Once you get into that area, you will see 4 choices:
 - i. Adviser registration
 - ii. Chaperone/guest registration (other than advisers)
 - iii. Student registration
 - iv. Registration report (final report of what you have registered for the RLC)
- 4. There are no cost calculations for the RLC as fees vary from region to region.

5. You will be notified by e-mail when your RLC registration will close.

6.Check the main page of the web site for known RLC dates. Remember, RLC online testing may take place BEFORE your RLC. It is from these registrations that test passcodes will be mailed to you.
